About this course

The Music MRes allows you to undertake a one year full-time or two year part-time, research project in Music. The programme has pathways in musicology, composition, popular music performance, music psychology and creative music technology. You will work with experts in the field to produce a developed practical portfolio, dissertation or report.

Introduction

Student research is diverse, which is facilitated by the design of the degree. Examples of past projects include critical work on topics such as music and UK politics, gender and musical theatre, technical projects such as using Max MSP in classical performance and augmented midi control for electric guitar, compositional portfolios from contemporary classical, modernism to folk songwriting and vapourwave. Whatever your interests your original research project can find a home in the MRES programme.

You will receive training in research skills which will support the development of your major research project through one-on-one supervision from one or more academic specialists in your subject area. Supervision is available from across the range of academic staff from within the Department of Music. <u>Please see our staff pages</u> for details of the diverse research interests of our staff members.

The MRes course supports the development of your research project with modules designed to develop your research skills. Students also take part in research focussed workshops and seminars.

The nature of the MRes encourages adventurous and exploratory research projects which are often interdisciplinary and can encompass a wide range of methodologies. The programme provides researchers with the critical and analytical skills needed to craft a final major project which can take the form of a detailed dissertation, a set of compositions, recordings, a prototype technology or other proposed and agreed upon outputs. You will engage in the wider cultural and critical aspects of the relevant area of expertise by undertaking research skills training modules before developing your project.

You will work closely with a research specialist in the musicological or practice-based fields in areas such as: musicology, popular music, music industries, composition, analysis, audio-visual media, music technology, or any applicable focus emerging from your proposed research topic. You will become part of our community of active researchers pursuing your own research interests in collaboration with an academic supervisor.

The MRes in Music provides excellent preparation for you if you are intending to to pursue a PhD in Music or the broader Arts and Humanities.

- Independent research skills
- Demonstrate a coherent methodology appropriate to the area of research
- Expertise gained through working with research specialists
- Develop your own unique research output/portfolio
- Develop the ability to select, assess, employ and critically evaluate a range of appropriate research resources (such as textual, musical, visual or material sources) to an advanced level.

Teaching and assessment

How you'll learn

Teaching on the MRes Music is delivered primarily through one-on-one tutorials but also includes a combination of workshops and seminars. All teaching takes place on campus or over MS Teams. The main core of the programme is the development of a research project with guidance from a specialist supervision team. Individual projects are diverse and student led. These can be focussed on written research or more practical areas such as composition, audiovisual work and performance strategies amongst others. Workshops take place alongside PhD researchers and include career development and professional skills for those wishing to embark upon a research career. Workshop numbers tend to be small, and a typical class would include between 10-15 students.

How you're assessed

Students on the MRes are assessed through a combination of formative and summative coursework. This takes several different forms across the modules, including examples such as annotated bibliographies, research proposals, presentations, compositions and essays.

Tuition fees cover the cost of your teaching and assessment, operating facilities such as libraries, IT equipment, and access to academic and personal support.

- You can pay your tuition fees in instalments.
- All or part of your tuition fees can be funded by external sponsorship.
- International applicants who accept an offer of a place will need to <u>pay a</u> tuition fee deposit.

If you're a UK national, or have settled status in the UK, you may be eligible to apply for a Postgraduate Loan worth up to £12,167 to help with course fees and living costs. **Learn more about paying for your studies**.

Entry requirements

The qualifications and exam results you'll need to apply for this course.

Postgraduate entry requirements

We accept a 2:2 honours degree from a UK university, or an equivalent academic qualification from a similar non-UK institution. This degree should be in Music or a closely related subject. You will also have to provide a sample of written work e.g. an undergraduate assignment.

International qualifications

Select your country or region to view specific entry requirements.

If you hold a bachelor's degree or equivalent, but don't meet our entry requirements, a Pre-Master's can help you gain a place. This specialist preparation course for postgraduate study is offered on campus at the **University of Liverpool International College**, in partnership with Kaplan International Pathways. Although there's no direct Pre-Master's route to this MRes, completing a Pre-Master's pathway can guarantee you a place on many other postgraduate courses at The University of Liverpool.

English language requirements

You'll need to demonstrate competence in the use of English language, unless you're from a majority English speaking country.

We accept a variety of <u>international language tests</u> and <u>country-</u>specific qualifications.

International applicants who do not meet the minimum required standard of English language can complete one of our <u>Pre-Sessional English courses</u> to achieve the required level.
