#### Three roles:

- Work with local partners to develop research and evidence
- Promote the work of UoL researchers on policy issues

### What is a party conference?





- An annual event for political parties to discuss and agree policy
- They offer an opportunity for organisations to meet and lobby MPs and other senior political figures
- Labour conference has been held in Liverpool for three consecutive years, but usually alternates between Liverpool and Brighton
- Conservative conference alternates between Manchester and Birmingham
- They are very large events around 15,000 people had passes to Labour conference in 2023
- They raise significant revenue for political parties

### Who attends party conferences and why?



- Politicians
- Businesses
- Think tanks and lobbyists
- Charities and voluntary organisations
- Party activists
- Experts (that's you!)

### Why should researchers attend party conferences?

They provide an opportunity to:

- Hear the latest on policy developments in your field
- Develop understanding of how policy is developed
- Meet people interested in your work policymakers and others working in your field
- Help you understand how your research can be applied
- Network with organisations you might want to work with
- Promote yourself as a 'go to' expert in your field

### Navigating party conferences



#### The Main Hall

- Speeches by the leader of the party and other key figures
- Votes on party policy
- In the secure zone requires a conference pass
- Ballots for the busiest events
- Conference speeches occasionally very interesting – but very often not

# Navigating party conferences



#### **The Exhibition Hall**

- A place for a huge variety of organisations to promote themselves, network and influence
- Charities, think tanks, businesses, media organisations
- In the secure zone requires a conference pass
- A great place to network
- Usually a fairly friendly space

# Navigating party conferences



#### **The Conference Fringe**

- A vast array of panels, speeches and drinks receptions
- Some events inside the secure zone many outside
- Opportunities to hear debates on policy and emerging thinking
- The most policy-intense part of part of conferences
- Academics and researchers often on panels

How to Save 25 million GP Appointments: The role of self-care in delivering an NHS fit for the future

- Visit the conference website in advance and search by keyword/topic
- Download the conference app for updates
- Be selective
- Events with 'big names' may be very busy get there early
- What do you want to get out of conference?
- Listen to others?
- Promote your work/network?
- Learn about a new area/topic?



- A quite different audience from what you may be used to
- No slides (usually)
- Short and snappy usually no more than 10 minutes
- Policy insights not research detail
- Focus on policy implications of your work and what policymakers should do in practical terms
- You will usually appear alongside at least one politician
- Be critical but constructive

### Your conference pitch

- What is your work about?
- Why does this matter?
- What's interesting about the way you approach this issue?
- What would you like policymakers to do with the information you provide?
- How can you help/work with this person/organisation?

### Following up on your conference attendance

- Follow up with contacts by email send them some of your work
- Sign up for updates from organisations/speakers you found interesting
- Write a blog about your experience for your departmental website
- Prepare for next year:
  - Is it worth getting a full conference pass?
  - Discuss potential events with partners
  - Look into funding
  - Discuss with your faculty research support team
