Introduction from the Chief **Financial Officer**

We published our first Sustainability Strategy in 2021, coinciding with a pledge to put the Sustainable Development Goals at the heart of all our activities. Steady progress towards the aims set out in that strategy has been made in the intervening years, including the launch of our Climate Plan and inclusion of sustainability as a cross-cutting theme in our strategic framework, Liverpool 2031.

It is encouraging that our progress has been demonstrated through year-on-year improvements in sustainability league tables, which we use to benchmark our performance across the higher education sector.

We are especially proud of our position in the 2024 QS Sustainability Rankings, which rose 100 places from the previous year, placing us 50th out of 1,403 institutions globally.

This is a long-term commitment and there is much to do, as is clear from the breadth and depth of our commitments in this strategy.

Thank you to the staff, students and others who have contributed to the considerable progress made to date -I look forward to the whole University community working together to achieve much more in the years ahead.


Governance

We are committed to transparency and will hold ourselves to account for the delivery of the commitments set out in this document through a new Sustainability Committee, which reports to the University's Senior Leadership Team. Our progress will be publicly reported through the University's annual Financial Statements, and in our annual Sustainable Development Goals report. Environmental data will continue to be reported through the Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) and our progress towards net zero will be reported using the sector specific Standardised Carbon Emissions Framework.

Sustainability is part of the University's annual audit cycle, and findings are reported to University Council as part of our assurance processes.

The Sustainability Team will play a crucial role in coordinating and reporting on key activities, but it is everyone's responsibility within the University community to embrace and drive forward our shared commitments in-line with the University's values.

Strategic alignment:

Research

Our interdisciplinary research will create global impact in addressing the greatest challenges facing today's society.



The University of Liverpool aims to create a fairer, better world through the global reach of its research.

Our location within one of the world's most famous maritime cities, combined with a history of innovation that spans lifechanging discoveries and partnerships, means that we are well-placed to tackle global challenges affecting our city region, as well as further from home.

Focussing on the physics and chemistry that will transform the future of energy, The Stephenson Institute for Renewable Energy commands £18m of active research funding that is helping governments and businesses across the world work towards reducing their carbon emissions. Combining our proven research strengths in the physical sciences with our strengths in AI and robotics, our unique infrastructure in the Materials Innovation Factory, and strategic industry partnerships such as our long-term agreement with Unilever, our research frontier on Materials Discovery is providing game-changing solutions aligned to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. Elsewhere in our Faculty of Science and Engineering, the Liverpool Institute for Sustainable Coasts and Oceans is key to addressing the twin global challenges of climate change and biodiversity loss, and our new Centre for Doctoral Training in Maritime Net Zero Energy Solutions is delivering 52 highly-trained researchers to address four vital net zero challenges currently facing the North West, the UK and beyond.

Our Faculty of Health and Life Sciences is at the forefront of health and climate research, having mapped vector-borne diseases in relation to climate change with the aim to protect society from some of the negative impacts of global warming. The Global Health Research Group Clean Air Africa conducts impactful research to inform policy and practice that raises awareness of household air pollution and its health impacts in communities reliant on solid fuels and kerosene for household energy. And, we are proud of our partnership with the Institute of Cancer Research to quantify the carbon footprint of clinical trials, which has resulted in the first publicly available method and guidance to carbon footprint a clinical trial that can be used to inform lower carbon trial design.

Our world-leading research surrounding human rights law from the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences is leveraging the shared vision of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, and the newly launched Heritage Institute is key to establishing a better understanding of the past in order to create a more prosperous, fairer, and healthier world for everyone. Meanwhile the Hesletine Institute for Public Policy, Practice and Place brings together academic expertise with policymakers and practitioners to support the development of sustainable and inclusive city regions.

Develop new solutions through our interdisciplinary research and partnerships which accelerate the progress of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

We will do this by:

- Establishing a new Interdisciplinary Centre for Sustainability Research
- Developing net zero solutions through our Materials Discovery Frontier: Harnessing Digital Materials Design for Net Zero Solutions
- Contributing new solutions through our existing research centres and projects.



Develop collaborative global partnerships to create knowledge and impact that make a positive difference to communities globally.

We will do this by:

- Using our networks to tackle shared global challenges
- Leveraging our existing strategic partnerships and initiatives to create outputs aligned with the SDGs
- Harnessing opportunities to develop new global partnerships aligned to the SDGs.

Conduct our research in a way that supports both social and environmental equity.

We will do this by:

- Acting at an institutional level, and collectively across the sector, to achieve the six priority areas of the UKRI Concordat for the Environmental Sustainability of Research and Innovation Practice
- Rolling out the Laboratory Efficiency Assessment Framework (LEAF) across all labs and workshops
- Exploring opportunities to reduce the impact of carbon intensive research activities, such as energy-intensive computing and servers, and clinical trials
- Ensuring that data, guidance, and support, are openly available to staff, enabling them to meet external environmental obligations and maximise opportunities for funding.





Strategic alignment:

Education and student experience

Our students will be empowered as global citizens to make a difference in a changing world.

The University of Liverpool aims to develop environmentally and equipped with the skills, knowledge, and values required to make a difference in both their personal and professional lives.

With over 30,000 students on campus and almost 3,000 studying our online programmes, we are uniquely placed to influence the future generation when it comes to sustainable thinking and behaviours. These students go on to join our network of 270,000 alumni across 180 countries, taking what they learn with us into their local communities and in turn influencing change across the globe.

In partnership with our Guild of Students, we aim to integrate sustainability into every aspect of student life from their education to extra-curricular activities. and their time living in our student accommodation. Acknowledging the growing awareness and concern amongst students, we will also support them to navigate complex sustainability issues in a way that promotes hope for the future.

Sustainability will be woven into the curriculum and wider student experience, connecting each discipline to the United Nations **Sustainable Development Goals** and enabling every student to gain relevant attributes, skills and knowledge.

We will do this by:

- Ensuring that Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) is embedded within all our taught programmes
- Exploring opportunities to develop new programmes dedicated to addressing the green skills gap
- Building opportunities to learn about the SDGs into all aspects of student life on campus.

Create a curriculum for all which is sustainable and inclusive in its content and delivery.


We will do this by:


- Ensuring that our curriculum supports us as a university in delivering our commitments to the SDGs

- Providing more opportunities for our students to volunteer with local organisations, businesses and charities
- Facilitating opportunities for students to engage with potential employers in the field of sustainable development, through careers fairs, living labs and grand challenges
- Providing students with an understanding of social and environmental contexts in local and global settings so that they have the mechanisms to tackle sustainability issues faced across the world
- Harnessing the work of the Sir Peter Rigby Centre for Enterprise to ensure students can explore enterprise through a sustainability lens.







Strategic alignment:

Sustainable campus and operations

Sustainability will underpin how we operate within and beyond our organisational boundaries.



The University occupies a large and mixed-heritage estate, which presents significant complexities for integrating sustainable practices into our existing assets. Our Estates Strategy has been designed to consider these challenges and will facilitate new mechanisms to embed sustainability into our estate planning and operations. It is underpinned by our Climate Plan, published in 2022, and more recent Biodiversity Plan, which set out our responses to achieving net zero carbon emissions for scope 1 and 2 across all sites where we have operational control, including our halls of residence which are home to 4,407 students each year, as well as the UK requirements for biodiversity net gain across our public realm.

In addition, we are committed to tackling scope 3 carbon emissions, especially those associated with our travel habits. waste, and supply chain.

Leveraging our status as an anchor institution within the city of Liverpool, and in support of our 'Place and Innovation' vision to drive prosperity and wellbeing for the Liverpool City Region, our commitments have been designed to drive social value, building on the figures published in our Economic and Wider Impacts Report 2024 which highlight that we contribute £183million in GVA and support 2440 jobs across the Liverpool City Region.

We will also utilise our influence to drive positive change with external partners across our value chain in line with our Procurement and Ethical Investment Policies.

Through development of these strategic plans and policies we will provide alignment to the cross-cutting 'People and Culture' theme in Liverpool 2031, offering direction for staff, with clear and actionable processes and guidance, empowering them to contribute meaningfully to university values and sustainability goals.

Strategic Alignment: Sustainable campus and operations

Our commitments

Sustainability will be embedded throughout our estate operations, creating sustainable, inclusive and resilient campuses.

We will do this by:

- Driving forward the implementation of our Climate Plan, including our key priority to develop a new Energy Strategy and Net Zero roadmap
- Achieving the success measures set out in our new Biodiversity Plan
- Reducing waste in line with targets set out in our Waste Management Plan
- Monitoring compliance with the University's Environmental Policy, through continuous improvement facilitated by our ISO 14001 Environmental Management System.

Address the environmental impacts of our digital infrastructure and services.

We will do this by:

- Considering the impact of the growing use of AI on energy consumption as part of the wider Energy and Digital Strategies
- Utilising frameworks to mitigate the environmental impact of computation labs
- Identifying opportunities to reduce e-waste associated with our IT Services
- Providing digital sustainability education and skills.

Develop sustainable procurement standards which actively promote local impact and supply chain equity.

We will do this by:

 Promoting principles of circular economy to eliminate unnecessary spending and consumption

- Implementing appropriate policies and frameworks that prioritise sustainability across our procurement activities
- Ensuring the data needed to effectively monitor and report on scope 3 emissions is available, accessible and accurate
- Building social value into our supply chain and contracts.

Create a confident and knowledgeable workforce that is empowered and supported to contribute to sustainability targets.

We will do this by:

- Embedding sustainability within our polices, processes and practices
- Supporting and empowering staff to develop their understanding and confidence in making sustainable decisions
- Ensuring carbon and environmental data are easily accessible to staff
- Developing a programme of sustainability awareness-raising to foster sustainability literacy and comprehension within our workforce.

Driving improved outcomes for our staff and local communities.

We will do this by:

- Using the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals to guide our policies and decision making
- Mobilising our people, skills and know-how to address inequalities and improve life chances across the Liverpool City Region
- Connecting local businesses with academic expertise and living lab projects.
